The program will provide students with comprehensive exposure to information technology and its critical role in the modern business environment. Eligible students will receive South Carolina Workforce Industry Needs Scholarship (SC+WINS) funding to cover tuition.




HGTC President Accepts Community Appearance Board Chairman's Award and Participates in Annual Arbor Day Ceremony

HGTC Announces Outstanding Success of its Recent Blue Jeans Week Fundraiser

Thanks to the generosity of HGTC employees, the Academic and Workforce Development Division raised an impressive \$1,800.00 for the McKinley Grace (MG) Strong Memorial Scholarship Fund.

The MG Strong Memorial Scholarship Fund was established in honor of McKinley Grace Thompson, a beloved member of the HGTC community, who lost her life to an extremely rare form of renal cell carcinoma in February 2023. Her diagnosis is only seen in five percent (5%) of patients. She also developed secondary ovarian cancer. McKinley Grace's legacy lives on through this scholarship, which supports local students at Conway Christian School pursuing careers in healthcare.

HGTC Executive Vice President of Academic and Workforce Development, Dr. Jennifer Wilbanks, expressed her gratitude, "Our Blue Jeans Week fundraiser exemplifies the spirit of community and compassion at HGTC. The funds raised will directly impact local students, and we are thrilled to support the MG Strong Memorial Scholarship Fund."

HGTC Professor Greg Thompson, McKinley Grace's father, shared his heartfelt appreciation, "I am profoundly humbled by and grateful for the generous participation of employees in the recent HGTC Blue Jeans Fundraiser. The support from the HGTC family not only honors McKinley Grace's memory but also empowers local students in their pursuit of higher education. Thank you for making a meaningful difference."

Kidney cancer awareness was also a key focus during the fundraiser. Kidney cancer ranks among the 10 most common cancers in both men and women. Symptoms include blood in the urine, an abdominal mass, and back or flank pain. Renal cell carcinoma (RCC) is the predominant type of kidney cancer, accounting for approximately nine (9) out of 10 cases.

The inaugural MG Strong Scholarship presentation is scheduled this month and will provide a \$2,500 scholarship to a deserving senior at Conway Christian School. Top applicants for the 2024 scholarship are all in the PACE program at HGTC.

HGTC Hosts 2024 Lecture Series for Addiction & Recovery

Series Featured Spectacular Celebrity Speakers Maintaining Recovery from Addictions

HGTC hosted the 17th annual HGTC Addiction and Recovery Series commencing on Thursday evenings starting January 25. The series showcased two celebrity speakers, four creative demonstrations from local recovery institutions, and several student testimonials of recovery from different addictions using diverse recovery methods. All events were free, open to the public, and held in the Burroughs & Chapin Auditorium on the HGTC Conway Campus. The series was presented by Horry-Georgetown Technical College and sponsored by ACCESS FAVOR, Conway Medical Center Foundation, Lighthouse Behavioral Health Hospital, and Shoreline Behavioral Health Services.

Headlining the series was actor and comedian, **Tom Arnold**. Arnold has had a well-publicized journey with addiction and child sexual abuse. His drinking and substance use began years prior to his leaving the Midwest, where he was born and raised, and where his sister became one of the most prominent drug dealers. He honestly shares the ups and downs of his recovery with audiences. Arnold says rehabilitation is an ongoing process. He has been attending 12-step meetings for 35 years and is sober. "It is something I work on every day," he said.

The following Thursday featured Kevin McCauley, MD, a Senior Fellow at The Meadows in Wickenburg, Arizona and co-founder of the Institute for Addiction Study in Salt Lake City, Utah.

Corporate sponsors of the series, including ACCESS FAVOR, Conway Medical Center Foundation, Lighthouse, and Shoreline offered presentations on recovery adding insight into aspects of addiction and recovery from a professional viewpoint. Students in recovery from different addictions and using different recovery methods presented descriptions of what it was like, what happened, and what they do on a daily basis to maintain their recovery.

The HGTC Addiction and Recovery Series was created in 2008 by HGTC physics and natural science professor Casey King to: increase public awareness of recovery in our community, educate the public on the biology and psychological basis that drives many addictions, demonstrate that addiction crosses all social and economic boundaries, reduce the stigma our culture assigns to those in recovery, and to demonstrate that recovery from addictions is possible through a multitude of methods and can be free to those who want it.

Professor Roberts' commitment to conservation and education shines through her work with the sea turtle program helping to find, relocate, and mark sea turtle nests for conducting nest inventories after hatching. Her hands-on involvement and initiative have greatly enhanced the effectiveness of the program, making it more educational, interactive, and enjoyable for both administrators and volunteers alike.

Professor Roberts was a former wildlife and research biologist for several years, including sea turtle research, prior to joining the College as a full-time educator.



HGTC Professor Appointed to SREB Commission on Artificial Intelligence



HGTC Applauds Historic Statewide Transfer Agreement Signing

HGTC President, Dr. Marilyn Murphy Fore, attended a press conference in January 2024 with Governor Henry McMaster and other state legislators at the State House in Columbia. It was a historic moment for higher education in South Carolina as leaders, including House Speaker Murrell Smith, Governor Henry McMaster, and SC Technical College System President Dr. Tim Hardee, gathered to celebrate the signing of the Statewide Transfer Agreement. This groundbreaking collaboration between the South Carolina Technical College System (SCTCS), Clemson University, and the University of South Carolina Columbia is set to streamline the transfer process, enhancing student success across the state.

This landmark initiative, designed to be dynamic with ongoing assessment and evaluation, aims to optimize student educational opportunities by strengthening the seamless transfer of credits from technical colleges to public research universities within the state. Key components of the agreement include the establishment of 30 or more credit hours of guaranteed acceptance and applicability to the student's major, maintenance of a minimum of 60 credit hours for specific programs, a reverse transfer credit option, annual data sharing, and a commitment to ongoing collaboration through faculty and staff convenings.

"I am thrilled to celebrate the signing of the Statewide Transfer Agreement, an endeavor I have wholeheartedly supported for many years," said Speaker of the House Murrell Smith. "This is

a great first step in a continued commitment to making education more accessible, affordable, and adaptable to our state's students."

"At a time when workforce development is crucial, the Statewide Transfer Agreement will make college more affordable and accessible, encouraging South Carolinians to pursue degrees in high-demand career fields," stated Governor Henry McMaster.

HGTC Receives \$5,000 Donation from Georgia-Pacific for Electrical Engineering Technology Program



HGTC Receives Grant from Blue Cross Blue Shield Foundation to Enhance Dental Sciences Program

HGTC was awarded a \$32,000 grant from the Blue Cross Blue Shield (BCBS) Foundation to upgrade the Dental Sciences program's lab equipment. The grant, titled "Dental Sciences Lab Equipment," will enhance learning outcomes and skill development for dental assisting and dental hygiene students, ultimately addressing the oral health needs of the region.

The \$32,000 grant, awarded by the BCBS Foundation, will fund the upgrade of dental science labs at HGTC. The project, slated to conclude in December 2024, aims to alleviate chronic barriers to oral health for vulnerable residents.

Horry and Georgetown counties face significant challenges in oral health, with a dental workforce shortage further exacerbating the issue. As the region's primary provider of postsecondary health and dental sciences training, HGTC plays a crucial role in addressing these challenges. The upgrade of dental labs will enhance student learning outcomes, promote retention, and produce highly trained graduates to fill the regional dental workforce shortage.

The grant will be used to upgrade dental science labs, focusing on digital radiography and clinical care preparation. Digital sensors and a dental manikin simulator will be added to provide students with hands-on experience and clinical competency. These enhancements will strengthen clinical skillsets, promote student retention, and better prepare graduates for the workforce.

The grant will directly benefit dental sciences students, of whom 54% are low-income, 38% are minorities, and 35% are first-generation college students. These upgrades align with the Foundation's oral health priorities and will contribute to the quality dental workforce needed to improve care outcomes in the region.

HGTC Announces Partnership Agreement for Teach to Teal Program with Georgetown County School District and Coastal Carolina University

HGTC has a new partnership agreement with the Georgetown County School District (GCSD) and Coastal Carolina University (CCU) for the Teach to Teal program. This innovative initiative aims to provide an accelerated pathway for aspiring educators, paving the way for their seamless transition into the esteemed Spadoni College of Education and Social Sciences at CCU.

"I am thrilled to launch this collaborative partnership between GCSD, HGTC, and CCU. We have a number of remarkable students who have expressed an interest in pursuing a career in education. With the Teach to Teal program, our students will be able to begin this journey while still in high school and finish with a degree from CCU with supporting coursework from HGTC," said Keith Price, Georgetown County School District Superintendent.

Under this collaborative agreement, students from the Georgetown County School District will have the opportunity to participate in dual enrollment programs, earning college credits through HGTC. These credits will serve as a solid foundation as students progress from HGTC's Associate in Applied Science (AAS) in Teacher Education program to CCU's Bachelor of Arts (BA) programs in Early Childhood Education, Elementary Education, Middle Level Education, Physical Education, and Special Education.

"We have a long history of collaboration with HGTC and Georgetown County Schools, and we are thrilled to continue our partnership with them on the Teach to Teal program," said Dr. Jamia Richmond, CCU Dean, Spadoni College of Education and Social Sciences. "This initiative will create a pipeline of future educators who could graduate with a four-year degree in less time and begin to fill vacancies within the school district. We believe it will positively impact our schools and the communities they serve."

The Teach to Teal pathway is designed to streamline the academic journey, enabling students to complete their degree within three years. Effective from the fall 2024 semester onwards, CCU will accept all transfer credits established in the SC Transfer Articulation Center, ensuring a smooth transition for participating students.

"We are excited to embark on this collaborative venture with the Georgetown County School District and Coastal Carolina University," said Dr. Marilyn Murphy Fore, HGTC President. "The Teach to Teal program represents a commitment to fostering the next generation of educators and addressing the growing demand for qualified teachers in our community."

This means that eligible students can seamlessly transition to Converse and pursue a Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Fine Arts, or Bachelor of Science degree in a chosen major.

HGTC graduates meeting the grade criteria with a grade of "C" or higher in relevant courses will be admitted to Converse with Junior standing at registration. Financial aid will be available for eligible students, provided grade-level progression supports it. Students will have the opportunity to explore Converse's diverse academic programs and engage in a supportive community.

"We are excited to build a strong partnership between Converse University and Horry-Georgetown Technical College through this transfer agreement," said Converse University President Dr. Boone Hopkins. "Our missions align in our commitment to empower students to become the transformative leaders and

Superintendent, Georgetown County School District




